Columbia Museum of Art Unveils Fountain Sculpture

A new work of art is set to grace Main Street. The Columbia Museum of Art has commissioned and completed a major fountain sculpture for the corner of Main and Hampton Streets on Boyd Plaza in front of the Museum, made possible by a leadership gift from Colliers Keenan.

Nationally known sculptor, Rodney Carroll created the sculpture, which features an interactive water feature. The sculpture design incorporates a play and interaction between lyrical, organic shapes in a variety

of metals and alloys. This adds color and motion to the abstract sculpture that mimics the play and activity of its many water elements. Carroll constructed the Museum project in his studio in Baltimore. The sculpture's name, Apollo's Cascade, was chosen by the artist because it evokes a life giving force. Carroll also felt the name had a classical theme in line with the art museum's mission.



Apollo's Cascade will be unveiled on Tuesday, September 25 at noon. Columbia Mayor Bob Coble, Museum executive director Karen Brosius and Colliers Keenan president and CEO John Folsom will speak about how contributions such as the fountain add to Columbia's attractiveness and position downtown as a place to live, work, and play. In addition, food vendors will be on hand and additional festivities are being planned. Make plans to attend the celebration and be part of a landmark Columbia event!☺

Celebrate Halloween and Experience Columbia in an Eerie Light!

The Ghosts and Legends of Columbia walking tour is a spine-chilling way to learn more about the history and rich fables of Columbia. Not only is it one of the city's most popular walking tours, but it is also the original year-round ghost walk. Starting at the George Washington Monument on the north side of the State House, the 90 minute tour encompasses the USC Campus and the Trinity Graveyard. During the tour walkers learn the rich history of Columbia, with an eerie twist.

Guides take walkers back in time to Columbia's early days with stories of wars and heroes, and the supernatural. Guide Jody Donnelly tells stories and warns visitors of many spirits along the way, one of which is the wrath of the soldiers of South Carolina's Palmetto Regiment.

Another supernatural encounter deals with a worker who helped with the renovation of the State House dome. As he was carving his name on a crossbeam, he lost his balance and plummeted to his death. Security guards have reported that they have seen the worker's spirit sauntering around the catwalk at night.

The Original Charleston Walks Inc. is the Ghosts and Legends of Columbia's sister company. Both tours have been featured on Home & Garden Television, CNN Travel Guide, The Learning Channel, and in several nationwide publications, including the *New York Times*. The Ghosts and Legends of Columbia tour begins at 8:00 pm. The duration is 90 minutes and covers a distance of one mile.

Top Ten Tips for Car Safety

Car break-ins are on the rise not only in Columbia, but nationwide. Car break-ins have increased by 16 percent in the past year. Police contribute much of this rise to the carelessness of car owners. Car owners leaving keys or valuable items in plain sight serve as a red flag for potential theft. Police forces everywhere are increasing security in high theft areas by stepping up patrols, and using bait cars to try and catch the car thieves in action. Police are also distributing fliers reminding car owners not to leave their valuable items in sight, as well as tips to avoid break-ins.



Here are a few tips to avoid car break-ins:

1. Close all car windows.
2. Lock all doors.
3. Don't ever leave your keys in your car.
4. Don't leave valuable or interesting items clearly visible (CDs, DVDs cell phones, iPods, purses, cash etc).
5. If you have antitheft stickers, make sure that they are clearly visible on a car window.
6. Remove the face plate from your car stereo when not in use.
7. Don't store valuables in trunk, which is often the first place thieves look.
8. If parking in a lot with no attendant, park near the stairs, elevator or a well-lit area.
9. If parking on the street, park in an area full of activity or in an open and well-lit spot.
10. Make sure that your car always looks empty inside.
